CREATE A BOOK TRAILER WITH COREL VIDEOSTUDIO®

A Workshop by Rhonda Dragomir

STEP ONE: Devise a plan.

- 1. Develop a proposed outcome and purpose for the video.
- 2. Create an overall visual theme, including colors.
- 3. Think of the overall mood, write adjectives to describe it.
- 4. Decide on an acceptable length. Two minutes or less for an online video.
- 5. Watch other videos for inspiration.

STEP TWO: Write the text.

- 1. Write tight. Phrases might be needed rather than complete sentences.
- 2. Be sure to include your hook and feature the central conflict.
- 3. Blurbs (200 words) are usually too long. Aim for less than 100 words.
- 4. Pay attention to alliteration and rhythm.

STEP THREE: Find and edit images.

- 1. Develop search terms based on your text.
- Search for images licensed free for commercial use: <u>www.unsplash.com</u>, <u>www.pexels.com</u>, <u>www.pixabay.com</u>, <u>www.morguefile.com</u>.
- 3. Search for licensed images you can use by purchasing them at a low cost: <u>www.pond5.com</u>, <u>www.dreamstime.com</u>, <u>www.istockphoto.com</u>.
- 4. A helpful website for more information: <u>https://www.benchmarkone.com/blog/8-sites-free-</u> <u>cheap-stock-photos/</u>.
- Edit images to a uniform size and resolution in order to create visual harmony. I recommend a 16:9 ratio, 1920 x 1080 pixels at 150 dpi resolution.
- 6. Save the images in a folder on your computer in a .jpg or .png format.
- Number the images in the order in which they will be inserted, using a three-digit format (001, 002, etc.)
- If you don't have good photo editing software, I recommend an online service at <u>www.photopea.com</u>. Watch their tutorials at <u>www.photopea.com/tuts</u>.

STEP FOUR: Find appropriate music.

- 1. Use the mood adjectives you used as search terms on music sites to find tracks that will suit.
- 2. Search the internet for free, appropriately licensed music, or purchase music tracks at www.soundcloud.com,
- 3. You may also hire a composer to create a custom sound track. My brother's site: www.custommusiccreations.com .
- 4. Keep in mind, if your mood changes throughout your video, you might need more than one track.
- 5. The best format for VideoStudio is .mp3.

STEP FIVE: Purchase VideoStudio and watch tutorials.

- 1. You may purchase VideoStudio at <u>https://www.videostudiopro.com/en/</u>.
- 2. Compare editions and prices and make an informed choice. I use the Ultimate version.

STEP SIX:

- 1. Create a new project.
- 2. Set preferences; use defaults except
 - a. On General tab, customize AutoSave to two minutes (default is 10).
 - b. Customize file saving location (working folder) to the one you created for photos.
 - c. On Edit tab, set default photo duration to your preference (default is 7 seconds, but this is long. I set 5 seconds).
- 3. Select the Edit tab and create a new project folder.
- 4. Import edited photos and music tracks to project folder.
- 5. Click and drag media to timeline.
 - a. Begin with typing titles/text into the Title1 timeline. Choose animations if needed, but don't go wild. Use only one font and color unless content dictates otherwise.
 - b. Insert music tracks to the Music1 timeline, edit title length to fit musical transitions.
 - c. Insert photos to the Video track; edit length to correspond with the music/titles. Select transitions and video filters if desired.
 - d. Play the project in the preview window to see the entire video (all five tracks); if you play the clip selection, it will only show you the selected clip.

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STEP SEVEN: Render the project to an appropriate format.

- 1. Select the Share tab and select an output format.
 - a. If you click on each format, the program will advise you how that particular format is best used.
 - b. MPEG4 is the preferred format for multiple uses, and a good resolution for uploading to YouTube.
 - c. Under the drop-down menu, you may select different options for the MPEG 4 size, etc. The default is 1280 x 720, a 16:9 aspect ratio, at 30 frames per second and 16 bit stereo audio. Only change this default if you've done your research. Remember: the higher the resolution, the bigger the file. Video files are HUGE! Your computer may freeze if you select a resolution higher than your video card can handle.
 - d. AVI files are best for burning on a DVD, because the DV stands for Digital Video. If your computer has a DVD-R drive, you can create the file (render the video) and then burn it onto a DVD. The DVD can then be duplicated for play on a computer or television. If you select this option, be sure to use the dropdown menu to select a 16:9 ratio (the default is 4:3).
 - e. Name your video file. If rendering a second time, DO NOT overwrite. Give it a different name.
 - f. Once you have made your selections, click the Start button. Rendering the video file will take several minutes. A progress bar is shown.
 - g. The video will automatically play when rendering is complete. If not, go to your folder and play the video with the appropriate app.
 - h. If you see elements that are rough or unpleasing, use the program to edit the video and render it again.
