A first-person story is an "I" story. You are the narrator and you are telling your own story. In Christian magazines, a first-person story often tells what God has done in your life or what you are learning about Him. Although you are telling a true story, you want to use fiction techniques to make your story interesting. These include show-don't tell, incorporating the five senses, and using emotion in your story.

There are straight forward first-person stories where you are telling your own story from your point of view. There is also ghost writing, where you are telling someone else's story in the first-person as though you are that person. A third option is "as told to" stories. "As told to" stories are someone else's story that are written in the first-person, but the writer does receive a byline.

Common themes for faith-based first-person stories:

- Trusting God with our families, our finances, our time, our health, etc.
- How our faith helped us through a challenging time
- Ways we've learned to develop a closer relationship with God
- Marriage and Parenting
- Learning to not worry

What It's Not:

- A sermon- don't preach to readers tell the story as though you are talking to a friend the takeaway for the reader should usually be implied, rather than stated explicitly
- Always centered on a life changing event it can be, but does not need to be everyday, relatable problems and solutions often work better I've written stories about every aspect of parenting lessons our kids teach us work well

Cheat Alert!



For years, anytime I wrote a first-person story about parenting for an adult Sunday school paper, I would edit the story to tell it from my child's point of view. The story still used the first-person. It was as though my child was now telling it. Obviously, this requires simplifying the spiritual lesson and some of the dialogue, but it was a great way to get an extra publication from the same idea.

Note about Rights: Always tell the editor in your cover letter that this story was previously published in another magazine told from the adult's point of view. I've never had an editor reject a story for this reason.
